

MOD SPORTS DAY (continued from last edition.)

Unlike sports which are over after a few seconds dash down a running track, Archery is more the pace of a golf match. This meant being at the sports ground by 10.30 am to set up one's tackle and be ready for sighters at 11.00 am. 20 stalwart gentlemen took part and two ladies. The men shot a St. George Round - 3 dozen arrows at 100 yards, 3 dozen at 80 yards and 3 dozen at 60 yards at a 4 foot diameter target, (Well at least I've hasn't gone metric. Ed.) divided into 5 scoring zones. After the first 3 dozen arrows there was a break for lunch and it is at this point in Archery that skill and judgement are required. One has to decide on the quantity of alcohol necessary to relax you sufficiently to shoot well - but not to see double! The competition finished at about 4 pm - I came 6th with a score of 550. There was also a team award but since a team consisted of 3 archers and I was the only one from PERME(WA) we were not eligible for that.

CIVIL SERVICE/POLICE ARCHERY MATCH

Shortly after Sports Day I received a call from the Chairman of the Civil Service Archery Society Team - They must have been getting desperate - (I was going to say that! Ed.) - in a match against the Police Forces team for the "Webb Cup". This cup was presented last year by the CSSA at their 60th Year celebrations at Crystal Palace in honour of Alf Webb who virtually founded and ran for 25 years the Civil Service Archery Society. It is shot for annually between a Police Federation Team and a Civil Service Team. This year's match was shot at the Police Archery championships held in the grounds of the Honourable Artillery Company at Finsbury Barracks. Sunday 18th July was a glorious day - a bit too hot in the morning and the organisers had forgotten to arrange for the bar to be open! this time a "York Round" was shot - 6 dozen arrows at 100 yards, 4 dozen at 80 yards and 2 dozen at 60 yards. A team of 7 Civil Service Archers shot against a nominated team of 7 Police Archers and I am pleased to report that we won by 6030 points to 5849.

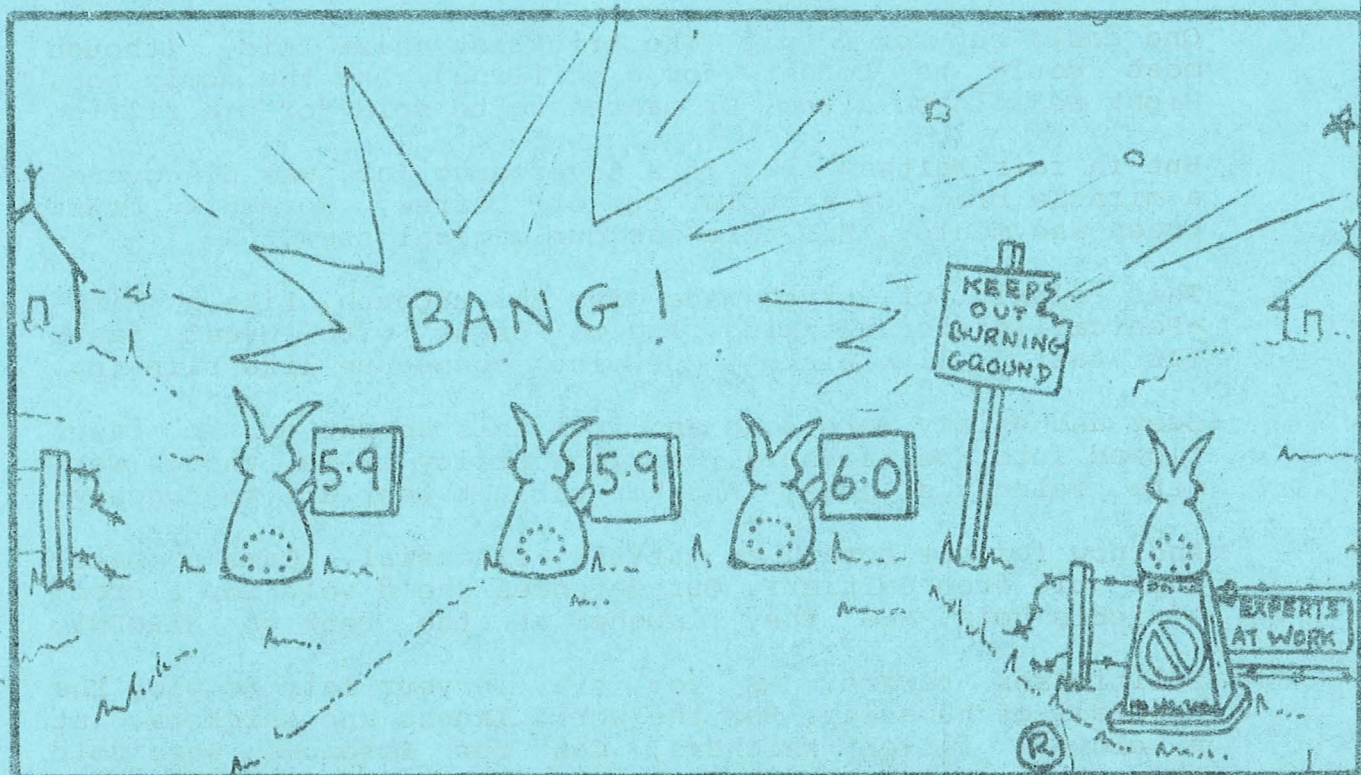
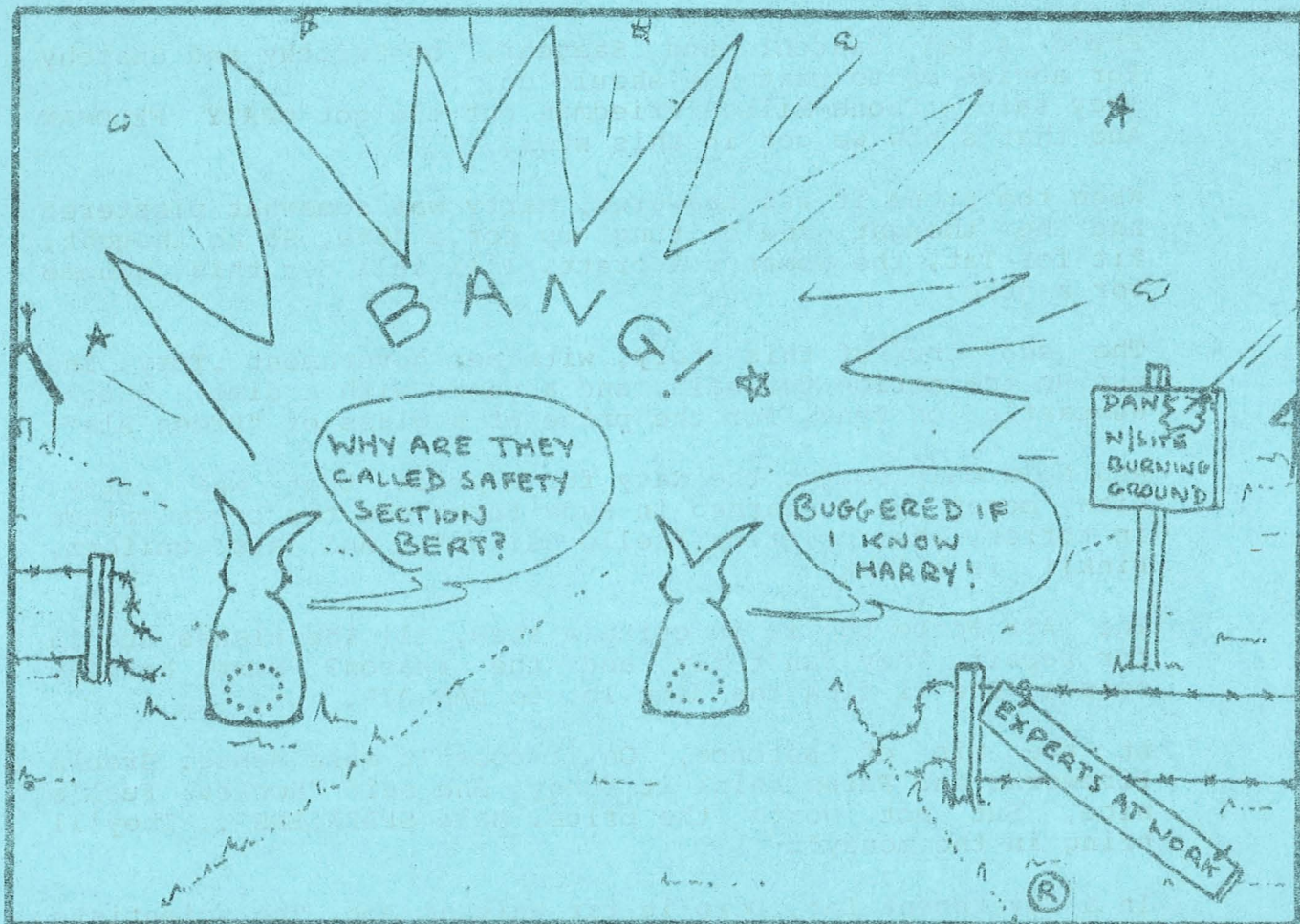
