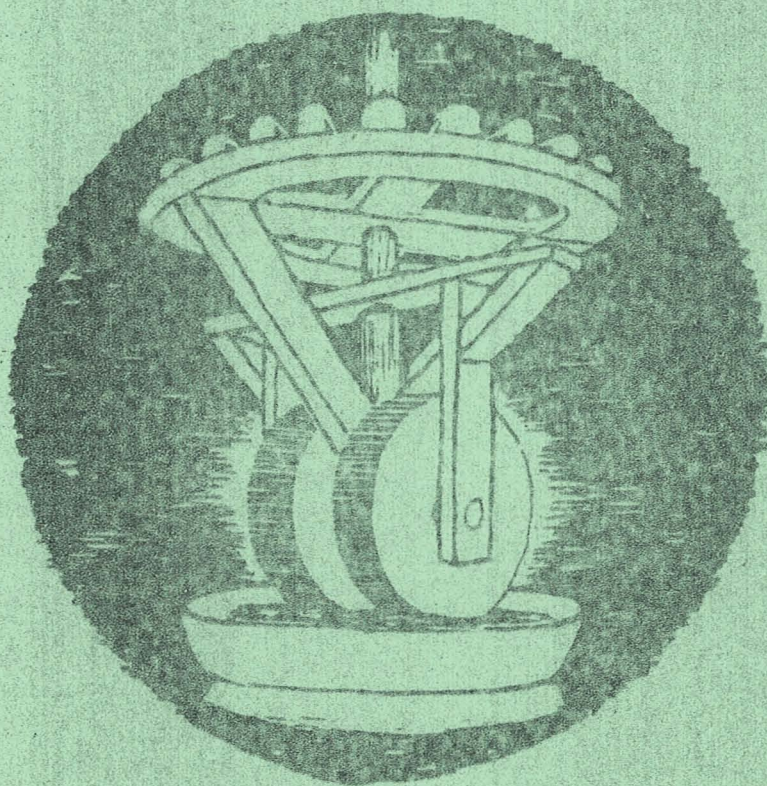

As regards the AGM we should welcome one new member, Iris Mezen, who we hope will be a valuable addition to the team. At the same time we say farewell to Valerie Evans who is leaving to take up motherhood. Our thanks to Val for all her efforts over the years.

One Constitutional change arising is that Full Members may now, on retirement, take up LIFE MEMBERSHIP by a single payment of one current year's subscription and may also take out Life Membership for their spouse with an additional year's subscription.

While on the subject of Membership it was agreed at the AGM that the question of voting rights be clarified - under the Club's Constitution only Members working at either of the two Establishments are entitled to vote at General Meetings (Spouse members who also work at the Establishments are ALSO entitled to vote).

The situation regarding the status of the Club has still to be finalised but at present it looks as if the actual premises are to be retained by the MOD and that the RD will lease the building, or parts of the building, from the MOD.

One matter raised at the AGM was the question of "free" drinks and it was agreed that where there is exceptional service to the Club there is nothing wrong with this practice but that all such "gratuities" be recorded.

Why not join the ERDE RIFLE CLUB ?

During the reign of Queen Victoria, the rifle was invented and from that the Association of Miniature Range Shooting was formed. In fact, Her Majesty fired the opening shot on the ranges at Bisley, the mecca of the shooting world. From those early days has risen the present National Smallbore Rifle Association, of which the ERDE Rifle Club is a member. In case you are wondering why we cling to the original name of ERDE it's not for nostalgic reasons but purely financial. The cost of changing our name and re-registering every gun is prohibitive so ERDE we remain.

There have been various ranges in different parts of the Establishment over the years and the present one is situated just outside the big double gates near the kennels, opposite the old Refinery Gate. It is an indoor range of 25 yards, 5 firing points and was built by the members themselves.

There is no sex discrimination in the shooting world, men and women of all ages can compete against each other, unlike most other sports where there are separate competitions. In rifle shooting the guys and gals get to lie alongside each other in the dark and it's all above board. Although there are no age limits to shooting' club membership is limited - from over 18 to 95. Membership is confined to members of the Powdermill Club and/or their spouses and children over 18 years.

We fire .22 target rifles with Martini Henry actions, there is no kick or recoil, all that is needed is good eyesight though glasses can be worn. Various targets can be used besides the conventional 25yd targets, ie. "Pimpernel", "Pot Luck", "Animals" "Eccentric", "Skirmishers" etc. Firers of all skills can compete in competitions as there are handicap shoots that give everybody a fair chance of winning a trophy. In fact the present Champion is an old age pensioner. During the 1984 Olympics, Great Britain Gold, Silver and Bronze for shooting so there is achance that somewhere out there is a potential medal winner for 1988.

Shooting takes place on Monday Nights from 7pm onwards and coaching will be given. Rifle shooting is a sport in which one is personally involved. Nobody can squeeze the trigger for you, nobody else can sight the rifle, it's in your own hands.

PERSONAL REFLECTIONS ON THE LONDON MARATHON APRIL 21st 1985.

On this fine April morning I duly turned up at the Red Start in Greenwich Park for the 1985 London Marathon. Even 1 hour before the start this vast area was a mass of tracksuited humanity and the air was thick with the smell of wintergreen. Overseas runners were very much in evidence, particularly the Australians and the French. Curiously, although any number of free cups of coffee were available, anyone requiring relief had a problem! Although the urinal was 300 metres long, as start time neared the queue for it became 5' deep for the complete length.

At 9.30 the starting cannon fired and from my forward position it only took me 15 seconds to pass the start line. However, with the sheer density of bodies it was another minute before I was able to stride out properly. The first 3 miles are very easy with downhill stretches and great crowd support, particularly at Woolwich. At this stage we passed a number of the wheelchair athletes who are much admired by both runners and spectators. I observed that most of these characters have arms thicker than my legs. After Woolwich I settled into a comfortable six and a quarter minutes per mile pace and was able to converse with other runners. Drink stations were plentiful and it is normal practice to pass cups round for the benefit of runners who had not managed to pick one up. Among my memories was passing the glamorous Lesley Watson at 4 miles, the less glamorous Paul Collins at 8 miles and the splendid jazz band on the roof of the Greenwich Co-op at 6.

There are always enthusiastic crowds through Lambeth and across London bridge but the stretch through the docks and Isle of Dogs is somewhat tedious. From St. Katherine's Dock at 22 miles the scenery picks up and the most striking part is where runners pass through the Tower of London, closed to the public and eerily silent, to emerge into Upper Thames Street where, by contrast there is a huge and noisy crowd. At this stage I felt quite strong but my leg muscles were beginning to tighten and the worry of seizing up dominated my thoughts for the rest of the race.

Approaching Parliament Square with the 26 mile marker in sight my right hamstring locked from buttock to calf and I had to walk, jog, hobble and eventually got going again. I could clearly see the clock as I approached the finish and knew there was some danger of missing my target of two and threequarter hours. However I crossed the line with 7 seconds to spare. It was an "interesting" way to spend a Sunday morning!

Many thanks to all the contributors and especially to my band of collectors without whom the logistic difficulties of collecting the cash would be prohibitive.

Each trip will be fully explained, both in terms of navigation, meteorology and how the plane is controlled. It may even be possible for you to have a "drive" yourself.

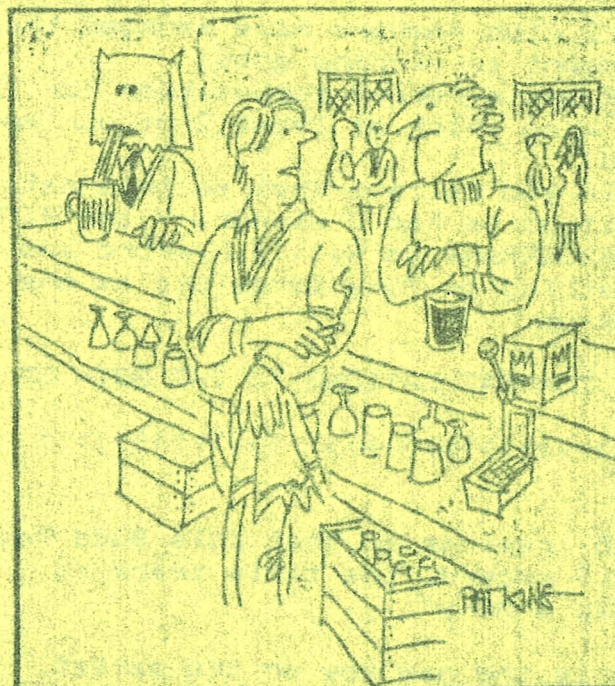
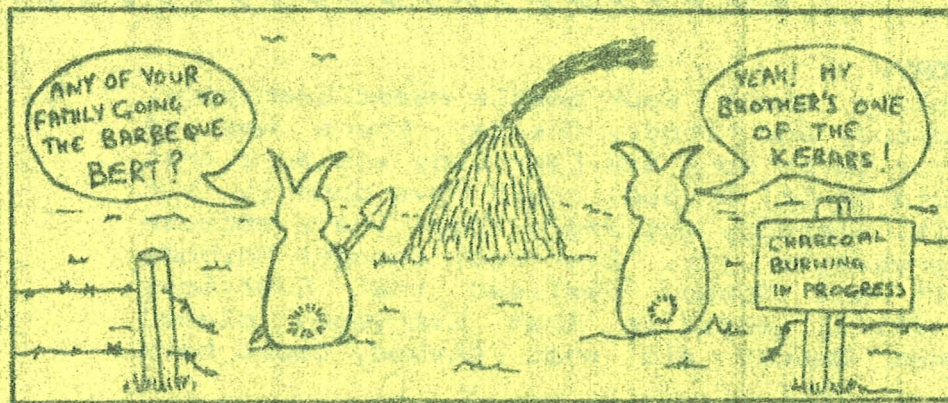

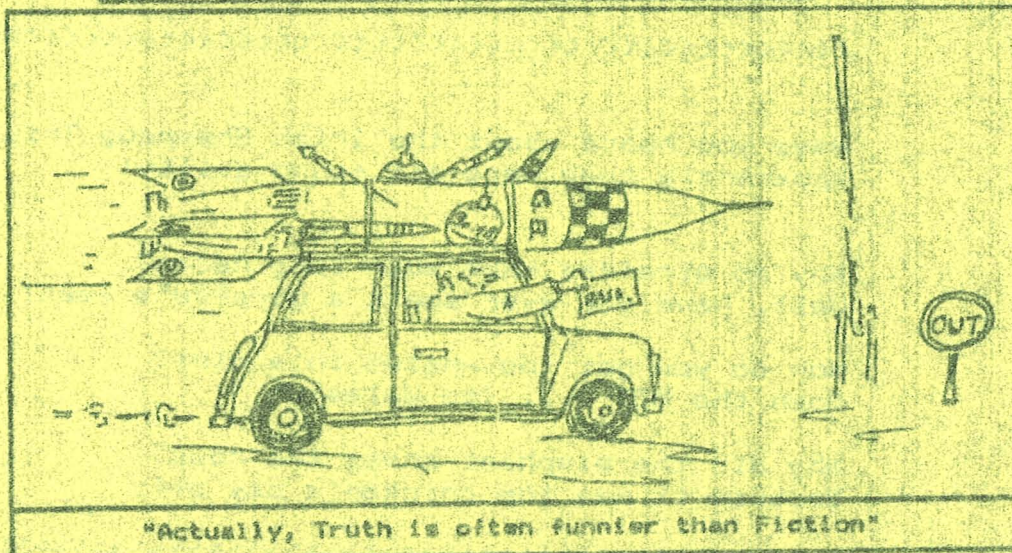
