""" THE NORTH SITE S.S.S.I.

What is a SSSI you may ask?, it is a Site of Special Scientific Interest nothing to do with the work here but from a Nature Conservation point of view. We did have two SSSIs and recently some RARDE personel interested in conservation had a meeting with the MCD Conservation Officer Lt. Col. Clayden and a representative from the Nature Conservancy Council (NCC) about renotification of the sites. The SSSI on the South Site contained a number of Orchid plants but these are much reduced due to the land drying out and the encroachment of the birch trees. This site is not being renotified. The north site SSSI is however being renotified, it consists of the large areas of woodland excluding the occupied buildings. This is the largest area of woodland in the Lee Valley Park and was origanally an alder plantation to provide charcoal for gunpowder manufacture. The alder and willow trees provide home and food for many insects that birds eat and the alder seeds provide vet more food, resulting in more than a hundred species of birds being recorded. This is in the addition to it's undisturbed nature, i.e. the security fence to keep the public out! This has allowed heronry to develope there, this year about 26 nests are occupied which makes it the largest heronry in Essex.

It is for these reasons that the area has been designated a SSSI. Unfortunately it is becoming invaded by a sycamore trees - not native to Britain. These do not have easily edible seeds and only support half a dozen or so insects species. If allowed to increase too much they would destroy the value of the site. The NCC in their recommendation for the management of the site would like to see the sycamore trees removed and some of the alder coppiced as was done in the days of gunpowder manufacture. This presents practical problems - even if money was found, as the heron have very long nesting seasons and they need mature trees to nest in. Work could only be done in October, November and December so as not to disturb the herons which would result in them not nesting.

Part of the interest of the area is the ponds and waterways and these must not be filled in. The north site contains two listed buildings and seven scheduled ancient monuments. These and other disused buildings provide valuable bat and owl roosts something lacking in many modern buildings.

Lt. Col. Clayden was also interested in the meadow lands on the north site as they are becoming rare as farmers spray their fields with herbicides etc. When allowed to grow for hay and cut for hay in the late summer many wild flowers flourish. In total on the north and south sites about 250 species of flowering plants and ferns have been identified (anyone know anything about mosses and lichens?!). The north site has it's Bee Orchids these while not being very rare are certainly not common. Lt. Col. Claydon commented that at Fort Halstead the grass cutting bill was considerably reduced by not cutting certain areas as frequently, much to the advantage of the wild flowers as well as the exchequer!

This has just been a brief summary of the meeting we had. If the Lee Valley Park eventually takes over the north site woodland I feel they should have a useful nature reserve. It is certainly great to work in an area of open spaces where I can go bird watching at lunchtime, not that I am an expert by anymeans.


