the press. Progress has continued during the year with the preparation of the second (Lorn) volume of the same *Inventory*, and with surveys of prehistoric and Roman monuments in Lanarkshire.

. In Argyll a start was made with the excavation of a Neolithic cairn at Achnacreebeag (Lorn) and this will be continued during the coming season. In Lanarkshire the excavation of the Roman fort at Bothwellhaugh was concluded, and in Peeblesshire a newly-discovered long cist at Logan Cottage, Tweedsmuir, was examined.

(vi) The National Monuments Record of Scotland

The emergency surveys made during the year include Faichfield and Skellatur (Lairds' houses), Aberdeenshire; Kildalton Chapel, Islay, Argyll; cruck-framed buildings at Dunbeath, Caithness; old glass cone, Alloa, Clackmannanshire; Archibald Place and St. Margaret's Well, Edinburgh; Archerfield House, East Lothian; Kincraig House and houses in High Street, Kirkcaldy, Fife; Burnfoot (laird's house), Millearne House and Newton of Condie (towerhouse with later additions), Perthshire. A reconnaissance survey of vernacular architecture in Orkney was also undertaken.

The library and archives continue to expand. The most important acquisition during the year was an extensive collection of the architectural drawings of Sir Robert Lorimer, given by Mr. Stuart Matthew.

(vii) Royal Commission on Ancient Monuments (including the National Monuments Record) for Wales and Monmouthshire

The greater part of the first volume of the Glamorgan Inventory is now in draft and under consideration by the Commissioners.

Fieldwork for the later volumes continues. For Brecknockshire, the map lists for field investigation for earthworks are complete, and fieldwork is in progress.

The Monuments Record has continued its investigation of houses; full surveys have been made of the following: Brecknockshire: Trewalter, Llangorse; Aberhowy, Llangynidr; Denbighshire: Brymbo Hall, Brymbo; Plas-y-pentre, Llangollen; Merioneth: Egryn, Llanaber; Dolgoed, Tal-y-llyn; Ceiswyn, Tal-y-llyn; Bod Llosged, Ffestiniog; Tan-y-Manod, Ffestiniog; Egryn, Llanbedr, Nant Llyn Gwedd, Llansihangel-y-Pennant; Gwastadfryn, Llansihangel-y-Pennant; Monmouth Parva Farm, Tintern; Montgomery: Peniarth, Meifod Lower Peniarth, Meifod; Glanfeiglo, Llanfyllin; Cefn Llyfnog, Llansantffraed; Wyddigoed, Llansantffraed; Ty-mawr, Llansantffraed; Pwylliwrch, Darowen; Pembrokeshire: Eastington, Rhoscrowther; Norchard, Penally; No. 36 High Street, Haverfordwest; Radnorshire: Ciliau, Llandeilo Graban; Wegnall, Presteigne; Burfa, Evenjobb, Upper Cross Cynon, Llanbister; Lower Cross Cynon, Llanbister; Old Vicarage, Glasbury; Neuadd, Llandrindod; Monaughty, Bleddfa.

Many others have been photographed, but are not yet fully surveyed.

The records continue to grow. We wish particularly to acknowledge the receipt of the following: Drawings: of historical and proposed works of architecture by Messrs. North and Padmore and H. In Industrial Archaeology, information has been exchanged with the National Record of Industrial Monuments panel, so that all data relating to Wales can now be consulted at Aberystwyth and at C.B.A. in London (as also at the National Museum of Wales and at the National Monuments Record for England).

The following monuments, in danger of decay or demolition have been recorded: Brecknockshire: Bridges in Usk Valley; Gunpowder—Works at Pont Nedd Vechan; Cardiganshire: Devil's Bridge, near Aberystwyth; Denbighshire; Bleach Works, Lleweney; Industrial Cottages, Bunkers Hill, Bersham; Ruabon Terra Cotta Works; Glamorgan: Pont Walby; Radnorshire: Knucklas Viaduct.

The most important work, however, was the survey, under difficult conditions during demolition, of the monumental group, at the Severn Tunnel Pumping Station at Sudbrook, of six Harvey's beam-engines arranged radially. This group seems to have been unique in Britain.

A survey was also made for the Monuments Record of the remarkable late or post-Roman hut-system on Gateholm, Pembrokeshire. This exceptionally interesting settlement is now almost entirely obscured by the thick and increasing growth of grass tussocks, but an unusually heavy snowfall made it possible to recover much of the plan.

(viii) Council for the Care of Churches

The Places of Worship Commission is still in session and unlikely to report before the end of 1969. One of the subjects to which it is giving particular attention is revision of the Inspection of Churches Measure to ensure smoother operation. It may not be widely realised that all C. of E. churches (whether parish churches or those of lesser status) have to be the subject of an inspection and report by a qualified architect at five-yearly intervals. These quinquiennial surveys have been in force since 1955, and in consequence of the resulting schedules of dilapidation presented to the Parochial Church Councils, the general standard of structural maintenance of churches is probably higher than

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
