- 1) View from Marsh towards Waltham Abbey. Buildings in middle distance from
 L to R. (1) Factory Buildings (2) Marsh Wardens Cottage (to right of
 Photographer) (3) Houses in Highbridge St. and Old Mill * 4) Kings Arms P.H.
 5) Bridge Over Lea Navigation 6) Old English Gentleman P.H. Abbey Church Tower
 in distance on left. This picture was taken during late 1890's or early 1900's
 as Abbey Tower was restored with battlement ornamentation between 1896 and 1904.

- 2) View of Waltham Lock looking southward from Barge River Bridge. This lock
 was moved to north side of bridge between the two wars (1914 and 1939)

- 3) View looking east from Barge river bridge of Highbridge Street towards the Abbey. Water on left and centre was known as Perry's river. Footbridge over this stream can be seen beyond the figures on pavement. This stream has recently been diverted in connection with road widening and elimination of Refinery bridge (seen in middle distance) 927/3
- 4) View from inside factory. Believed to be near the Refinery gate, one of these buildings may be the old hospital? Note old powder barge. 727/4
- 5) Highbridge Street from Refinery bridge. The two blocks of cottages on left were demoxilished several years ago, and others built, but the County Court(on left) and the Almshouses and "Ordnance Arms P.H." as well as most other buildings in the street were destroyed by a German V2 rocket in 1945. The small portion of wall on left of picture is however still standing at present time (February, 1968)

- 6) View inside factory, believed to be near main gate. 9 27/6
- 7) View inside factory, location uncertain but shows a second old powder barge. 927/7

- 8) Long walk inside factory. It is believed that this was opened to the public to a limited extent at one time, as people now living locally can remember being taken in there as children.
- 9) This view is believed to be of the land on which Waltham Abbey Town Hall now stands. Apparently it is the old Waltham Abbey Volunteer Fire Brigate Station and building beside it. It has the words Reading room on the windows, 927/9
- 10) The Factory Fire Brigate about 1900. 927/10
- 11) Five members of the "Turnham" family, who were all employed at some time or other at the R.G.P.F. Their names occur frequently in a book of "Historical Notices" of the Royal Gunpowder works".

John Turnham (Front row left) was a Principal Foreman between 1887 and later.

He was my wife's grandfather. The earliest mention of the family name of Turnham in the book mentioned above is in the year 1787. It has always been understood that a man of that name was one of the earliest to receive a licence from Queen Elizabeth I for the manufacture of gunpowder at Waltham Abbey. This cannot be confirmed as the earliest pages of the "Historical notices" book are unfortunately missing in the copy in my possession.
