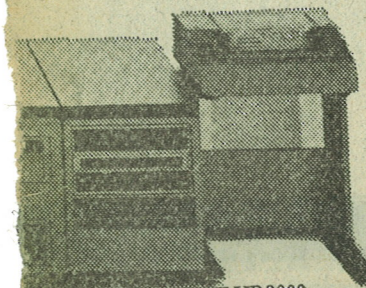

Navy seeks more

THE Navy is seeking volunteers from within the Service to join an elite group of electronic eavesdroppers.

Until now even the existence of these specialists, known as Communications Technicians, was kept secret, although the branch was formed in April 1978.

Their task is to operate detection and direction finding equipment to pinpoint the source, power and type of both radio and radar transmissions; and to note any points of special significance to identify them.

Each volunteer needs some

for

knowledge of a foreign language and must have a high level of technical skill in using electronic equipment, Morse Code, radio telephony and other communications equipment.

NAVY MISSILE TESTS ARE SUCCESSFUL

The first long-range missile for the Navy's new powered Fleet submarine completed successful tests in America as part of a £10 million contract, the first of its kind. Britain has placed in America for many years.

The 60-mile-range tactical missile is to replace the 21-mile-range anti-ship missile, first produced in 1960, that at present is used on the Navy's conventional nuclear submarines.

For eight months the Royal Navy's nuclear submarine has been trying out the new missile in American waters and has launched more than 100 while submerged. In the tests all six missiles fired their explosive warheads and destroyed the target ship.
