


The Turnhams at the Mills

Kper WAHS

The Turnham family members comprised one of the Mills 'dynasties'.

We can trace the connection from the hiring by the Ordnance in 1787 of James Turnham Senior as a labourer, later Warder at the Refinery House, through no less than twelve members of succeeding generations to Herbert who entered the Gunpowder Factory as a Writer in 1882.

Research by Waltham Abbey Historical Society indicates that the photograph was probably taken around the time of the 1881 Census and that the older of the men in the back row was Edward and the rest his sons - the Turnham brothers, Edward, John, James, Joseph and Walter. Edward Senior was a retired master cooperbarrel maker and repairer. Joseph and Walter were the youngest and from appearance were the two wearing the caps, possibly to indicate a more junior position. Both were coopers. This leaves three in the front - John, James and Edward. John was a factory foreman and was possibly the figure in the middle with James on the right and on the left Edward, holding the barrel top, both coopers.



He was my wife's grandfather. The earliest mention of the family name of Turnham in the book mentioned above is in the year 1787. It has always been understood that a man of that name was one of the earliest to receive a licence from Queen Elizabeth I for the manufacture of gunpowder at Waltham Abbey. This cannot be confirmed as the earliest pages of the "Historical notices" book are unfortunately missing in the copy 927/11. in my possession.

Dear Mary,

Thank you for your e mail.

I have now traced a second Turnham photograph and the two are enclosed. It is particularly fortunate as they provide a contrast between the formality of the first (No.1 on reverse) and the work situation (including bowler hats!) of the second (No.2). In this one I am not sure whether the sixth figure, the one in the uniform at the back, is another Turnham or an interloper who having got in on the photograph has chosen to direct his thoughts to faraway places.

One or two snippets of further information:

It appears that the first photograph was one of a series of Waltham Abbey photographs taken around 1900, in the hands of a Mr. Taylor who passed them to a Mr.H.J.Moore for forwarding to the Mills collection. Mr. Taylor's wife's grandfather was John Turnham, photo No.1 front row left. Herbert H. Turnham, who commenced work at the factory in 1882, was a son of John Turnham and was the uncle of Mr. Moore's wife.

I'm not sure whether any of this ties in with information you have but we would be very grateful for any information which you can provide on the Turnhams at the Mills - photograph identification, family ties etc.

Thank for your kind offer of a donation, which will be much appreciated. There will be no charge for the copies.

We are glad to have been able to add to your family history.

It is possible that the 'interloper' is the Herbert Turnham you mention and who was my grandfather. We are fascinated to see that the face of John Turnham, my great grandfather, has distinct resemblance to my father except for the beard!

Do you have any contact addresses for the Moore or Taylor families that provided the photographs? It would seem that the two wives mentioned in your letter would be my father's cousins, daughters of one or both of his aunts, and I would be very interested to make some contact with the families!

I will be contacting you by post with what I know about the Turnhams. However, at the moment my genealogy program and everything on my computer is unreliable or missing after a major hardware problem so I cannot actually access the data to see or print it. Only my internet connection works! I hope it will not be too long before things are back to normal.

Further to my e mail, I have been speaking to the Waltham Abbey Historical Society in the hope that someone will be able to provide information on the Moores and Taylors. So far nothing specific has emerged, but they have taken a copy of the note forwarding the photographs and are investigating further.

They are very strong on the social history side and for Waltham Abbey much of this of course covers employees of the Mills. They have recently completed a summary of their findings on the history of some of the Mills 'dynasties', including the Turnhams, and I enclose a copy of the Turnham section. It could be that most of this is known to you but perhaps part is new.

One thing which has cropped up is a note which gives the original enquirer on the photograph as a Pauline Mills. It is possible that this has got misplaced, but just in case does this ring any bells with you ?

I was so excited to receive the packet of things that you sent me. It was so unexpected and I do thank you and the Waltham Abbey Historical Society very sincerely.

I did not know a lot of what is on the WAHS sheets and it extends my knowledge considerably. I do have some facts to add but I did not know any details except for dates on the whole. I also have noticed a bit of inaccuacy which needs correcting. I will write to them. (For example, the mother of John Turnham, the foreman, was not Charlotte - Edward, John's father, was married twice so that John, Edward and Mary are children with his first wife, Mary Harknett, and the rest are his children with Charlotte Mansfield.)

I look forward to the Christmas card and to anything else you discover in the course of your research.

Unfortunately my computer problems hve got worse rather than better. After complete hardware failure I have bought a new computer. However, this will not accept my genealogy program which is old and I cannot retreive my data! I hope to get it sorted soon though I fear a lot of typing will be needed! Dear Les

Thanks for your interesting letter. I was about to write to you – I know that sounds as if I am just prompted by your letter! Yes, I have added to my knowledge of the Turnhams quite a lot in the past twelve months, although the extra data involves the Turnhams after they left the Waltham Abbey/Cheshunt area. I have been in touch with Pauline Mills and we to have pooled our lines of the family tree. We are both directly related to Edward Turnham senior, Pauline through his son Edward and myself through son John. We have met a couple of times now and have much in common.

Research on the diaries is frustrating to say the least. I discovered that Rosina, the widow of Bernard Turnham (who was the son of the writer Walter Turnham), died in 1993 and after obtaining her death certificate I found that Roy Walter Turnham, Bernard's son, was the informant and I wrote to the address in Steyning, Sussex that he gave. The current occupants moved in during 1994 but unfortunately they did not recognise the name Turnham so the lead went dead.


Since then, I have had interesting correspondence with an Arthur Turnham and his son John who contacted me via a family history web-site, Genesreunited. They too had been in contact with Peter Huggins after a visit to Waltham Abbey and we have pooled our knowledge of the Turnhams. Arthur is a descendant of James Turnham, fishmonger of Highbridge Street and brother of Edward Turnham senior. Arthur (who is very active at 92) had made enquiries 3 or 4 years ago about the diaries and had correspondence as recently as Christmas 2002 with Roy Walter Turnham, who at that time did have possession of the diaries, and told Arthur that he would write again. However, contact has been lost, he is not in the phone book now Arthur tells me. I may need to write to Arthur to find out what the last known address was. Roy had sent Arthur a picture of the diaries, a copy of which I enclose. So close but yet nowhere near them!

Thank you for telling me about Maisie Dupuy. I will contact her as you suggest and hopefully both find out more of my family tree and maybe I can pass on some of the information I have received from you and other people. I see in the photocopies from Maisie that her father was James Slade. Bernard's wife's maiden name was Rosina Slade and she seems to have been the aunt of Maisie. Roy Love is also mentioned in the photocopies and I am sure you will remember that he was the person who lent the diaries to Essex Record office to be filmed. It looks as if he is/was married to another sister of James Slade (and hence is Bernard's brother in law as we know). I'll ask if she knows Roy's address or that of any children he might have had. Maybe there is scope here to find the diaries – third time lucky perhaps!

I hope you have a good Christmas and that 2005 is kind to you.
