


The next step is a: logo competition

Tree Planting Ceremony at Fort Halstead



In 1987 when WA celebrated it's Bicentenary a tree was planted on the North Site to commemorate the occasion. Since the future of the site is uncertain it was decided that, as well as staff, the tree should be relocated where we could keep an eye on it. The tree, a weeping copper birch (*Betula pendula purpurea*) was replanted outside one of the newly built laboratory blocks (A28) last December. Dr Geoff Hooper officiated at the occasion and was ably assisted by a number of WA expatriates plus a few of the indigenous population.

As Geoffrey said 'let it be a reminder of the spirit of Waltham Abbey - and I hope it doesn't die!.


THE IMPERIAL SERVICE MEDAL

There was a welcome return to Waltham Abbey on 6th December last year for a large number of past employees attending a rather special event. Seven of our former colleagues were formally presented with the Imperial Service Medal in recognition of their "long and meritorious service". There was to have been an eighth presentation, to Alf James; a personal presentation was made to him two days previously and it is with sadness that we have to report that he died shortly after.

Collectively, those honoured, had served a total of over two hundred years at Waltham Abbey and it is some reflection on the Waltham Establishment that it could inspire the loyalty and dedication given by those honoured.

The medals were presented by Dr Geoff Hooper, representing the last of a long line of Heads of the Establishment. In his introduction Geoff indicated the criteria for the award of the ISM as being not just long but meritorious service and he gave ample illustration of this in his citations on each and every recipient.
