
The information reproduced here is, in the editor's opinionentirely legitimate since it represents the best contribution received so far on what people are doing now.

This is a new venture in the world of Wildlife Holidays. I have a wide knowledge of natural history from my early schooldays. When at Waltham Abbey I worked in a voluntary capacity as Secretary to the Enfield Natural History Society and also as a Conservation Officer for the Enfield group of the RSPB. Our holiday logo is the Speckled Wood butterfly and is in keeping with my roots as an Enfield-born naturalist since it was first described by Petiver in 1704 as the "Enfield Eye".



Our current programme of Nature Breaks are planned and led by myself and designed to reveal the variety and the complexity of the wildlife and habitats in the South Hams.

The area covered is relatively small, but encompasses a wide range from low-tide rock pools to granite tors on Dartmoor.

The small area around East Prawle and Prawle Point alone has a bird list of over 320 species.

Even if your interests lie in directions other than Nature Breaks we would be most happy to accomodate any ex-colleagues wishing to visit the area on a bed+breakfast basis. We are, after all a business! Alternatively if you are down this way and would like to pop in for a chew over old times (on a strictly non-paying non-consultative basis) we will make you most welcome.



#### A BIRD'S EYE VIEW

Some people have asked me what changes I have seen in the move from Waltham Abbey to Fort Halstead. The two major changes are the drive round the M25 each day and my office. The drive has to be suffered like everyone else but has been made simpler since the QE II bridge has been opened.

At Waltham Abbey my office always looked out on another building or a car park. My new office looks out on a hedge, moat and the Old Fort. This is far more peaceful and I have become a bit of a bird watcher during the lunchbreak. Supplying nuts and birdfood has resulted in a fascinating variety of birds. The curiously absent species are starlings and sparrows, whilst blue tits, great tits and chaffinches can be observed in large numbers. Less well known species such as the treecreeper and nuthatch (not the RO variety) can also be seen and the spotting of a different species can be quite distracting. My list currently numbers 16 varieties with a new one being added about once a month. Whilst other-things have gone downhill resulting from the move the view from my office is considerably better. Wild primroses and daffs are now out adding to the splendour. The sight of the grey squirrels throwing themselves against the windows requesting food is something else to be seen.


The final arbiter on any decision in dispute shall be the current editor.


