Keen botanists, among your readers, may have observed a new phenomenom along our urban areas in that a previously rare form of the rubber tree, Hevia Patensis, is apparently thriving in our urban gardens. The evidence was most noticeable last autumn when a close inspection of fallen leaves produced large numbers of peculiarly shaped integuments from the dissemination bodies of this species. These take the form of pale brown looped strands, up to about 100mm in length made from a remarkably resilient material. They have been observed as far apart as Essex and Northumberland and tentative estimates puts the number falling on our footpaths as high as four million each day!

It seems sad that this, now indigenous, resource is not put to some use and it appears that no mechanism exists for harvesting this potentially useful crop.

An immediate suggestion as to possible use springs to my mind - they would ideally suitable for the bundling of etters by the Post Office prior to house to house delivery.

No doubt other uses will suggest themselves to the ever fertile imaginations of your colleagues.



Until such time, rest assured that they are being lovingly preserved.




New Homes for Old Things








MEDICAL MATTERS

The following article is going the rounds within DRA and is reproduced here without permission or acknowledgement

from our Medical Correspondent:

A study of the most recently identified work and environment related disorder has demonstrated that sufferers pass through 3 phases of the condition.



We will keep you posted.





























