In Memoriam

Arthur Stokoe

We have been informed by Arthur's wife Jean that he died on 9th Jebruary. He was a quiet, unassuming soft-spoken Scot and, despite a long period of service at Waltham Abbey, little is known of his early history. We believe that he was co-opted into the Ministry of Supply during the war and then went onto Woolwich. Arthur was one of the 'founder members' of DMXRD and was responsible for setting up the Rubber Labs at Waltham Abbey; first under Dr Johnston and then Warburton Hall in the late fifties. His efforts made Waltham a well respected lab within MOD and other research institutes. He remained at Waltham until he retired in 1977. Arthur was a well respected rubber technologist who offered practical solutions to rubber problems that really worked. Possibly his best work was with Bob Richards on hydrazine resistant rubbers. He is remembered as a most generous and helpful colleague.

Captain James Bell MC 1916-1996

Jim's career started in the quality control labs at Lever Brothers after gaining an ARIC at Manchester University. At the start of the war he was seconded to JCJ Huddersfield where he worked on signal flares. His initial application to join the army was declined because of his 'war work' but he was later invited to join 'a military civilian organisation' and was told to report to 64 Raker Street; he found he had joined SOE (Special Operations Executive). After a period training SOE agents in the use of explosives Jim went to Ringway and trained as a parachutist and helped develop the hazardous technique of dropping into water (at night). On the invasion of Italy Jim was transferred to a training school in Southern Italy and later dropped into the Aosta Valley to work with the partisans behind German lines. For his work alongside the partisans Jim was awarded the Military Cross and made a life member of the Italian Communist Party. Jim had considerable respect for the communist partisans and was very proud of the latter honour. It caused some consternation when he wrote it on his form when he was subjected to Positive vetting in the '50s. After the war Jim spent some time in Germany obtaining and safeguarding explosives required to restart production in the Ruhr coal mines. On demobilisation Jim joined JSRG at Waltham Abbey and worked there until his retirement to the Isle of Man.

Away from work Jim was interested in exotic vehicles, at one time owning two vintage Scott twin water cooled two stroke motor bikes. His ultimate joy was an E type Jaguar. His other interest was in his succession of beautiful Irish Red Setters.

The following was spotted in the Daily Telegraph obituary column by Eric Baker and may be of interest. Perhaps one or two can remember Mr Sylvester?

William Sylvester, who has died aged 81, was awarded the Empire Gallantry Medal (translated in 1941 into the George Cross) after an explosion in the RGPJ on 18 Jan 1940. At the time he was engaged in purifying NG inside No.2 Wash House. This only 100 yards from the scene of detonation and the building had suffered considerable damage; half the roof torn off, two thirds of walls collapsed and hot water and air services interrupted. Although well aware of the danger from the possibility of NG freezing he remained at his post for two hours until the charge had been processed and stability restored. After the explosion he moved with the RGPJ to Wrexham where he lived for the rest of his life. He is survived by his wife Eileen.

We would welcome any news in this area.


Incidentally, do any of those volunteered for the Oral History Project have any news or up-dates for us?

ALAN RAPLEY TO CAPTAIN ATLANTA SQUAD Buxton's Olympic swimming hope, Alan Rapley, has earned one of sport's top accolades. The 25 year old has been made captain of the British swimming team competing in this summer's Olympic Games in Atlanta.

Alan, who will compete in the 4x100m relay team and perhaps the 50m freestyle, said "I was overwhelmed when the selectors told me. I feel very honoured, to captain my country at the Olympics is just unbelievable.

Alan's duties will be finalised when he soon jets off to a training camp in Florida with the rest of the British team. "I expect it will involve a lot of running about and liaising between the coaches and other swimmers but it's really a case of wait and see"



The team will fly out to Atlanta on July 5 to acclimatise and settle in at the Olympic Village. Before then Alan faces 17 weeks of training and preparation.

"I can't wait for the Games to start" said the City of Sheffield swimmer. "I've first got to come back down to earth after gaining selection and then begin all the hard work"

Congratulations! I'm sure we'll all be watching out for Alan when the Olympics start. Ed.

I say also unto you that it is easier for a camel to walk down Sun Street in the rush hour than for zealousness and conscientious work to have its reward in ERDE.

In the years that are yet to come, we the faithful, pray that the light will shine in the dark places of ERDE, that generations, yet unborn, who follow us will reap the benefits of us, the early Martyrs.
