# FRIENDS ASSOCIATION WORKING PARTIES

As we near the end of 1998 I felt it would be worthwhile reviewing what has been achieved so far and what remains to be done on preserving and recording the large number of recovered artefacts.

A total of 528 items of historic interest were recovered from the South Site together with a further 93 originating from Powfoot and Chorley and stored on the Site for 'safe keeping'. Each item was logged, tagged, photographed and taken to Building P708 (before it was demolished) ready for shipping to North Site. All items were decontaminated, either by rigorous washing and inspection or by 'Thermal Remediation'. (We just loved that expression).

The working party consisted of Ron Treadgold, George Savill, Denis Mansell and yours truly. We were much energised and aided by Howard Prosser from

RO Chorley who spent, on average, two days each a week on site for about five months. Our thanks go to him and the rest of the Royal Ordnance staff on South Site; including Alan 77 Heath and Terry Stemman. They discovered all sorts of unusual objects of which we were unaware. Lynne Lennard of RO also helped by slaving away on a hot computer to produce lists of all the items saved.



While we provided the manpower the WARGM Company gave us good moral support in the shape of Geoff Hooper who arranged the moving of large items by Bob Bray, under contract. Bob's men also carefully disassembled two Nitrocellulose Wash Houses, the RDX Building and M349 (the old 'Box and Tray Store'). These buildings are now on North Site in the old Boiler House awaiting re-assembly on a suitable site.

The smaller artefacts now reside in what was the Building Works Stores and the first task was to separate items from the two Sites. Outside, on the hard standing where the Carpenter's Shop used to be, are some larger objects, some of which need to be put under cover before the snows arrive!

Further work parties have since been organised for the next major task of cataloguing and preserving the artefacts from the North Site which, although not as urgent as saving South Site artefacts, barely ahead of the demolition developers. remains a mammoth task.

# **ARTEFACT IDENTIFICATION** or EDUCATING ARCHAE......

During the decontamination of the North Site literally thousands of artefacts were recovered and are currently stored, in boxes, in the old Building Works Stores building. Each item now has to be recorded, numbered and bagged and placed on shelving. The most difficult part of the process comes in identifying, if at all possible, what each item is or was used for. Some are easy and some are not!



The North Site's archaeological assistant, Andrew Passmore (hence the title above 'Educating Archae.. Andrew!) is doing his best but does require the input and more intimate knowledge of past employees to assist in identification. This does not exclude newer members who did not work at the Establishments as there is still the task of cataloguing and recording the many items. This work is on-going and is expected to take many months. At the mo-

ment you can't see the floor for boxes!

#### ADDITIONAL COLLECTIONS

Apart from sorting out items currently on site there is yet more Waltham items to be collected from elsewhere. First, there are 150 items currently stored at Westcott, including 14 apprentice's models, 52 folders of photographs and 41 fire appliances including the cast iron fire alarm pillars.

Then there are all the items still at Fort Halstead, including the Powder Barge, Explosives Truck and Sundial when there is suitable storage space.

We haven't yet considered other RO sites that 'plundered' Waltham in 1989 and may not need the item now.

It looks as if 1999 will be another busy year!

## ROYAL GUNPOWDER FACTORY WORKERS Living in Waltham Cross in 1891

Many of the workers at the Mills lived in the Waltham Cross area and, thanks to the work done by the Local History Group of the Lea Valley University of the Third Age, I had access to the 1891 census for Waltham Cross and Cheshunt. From this census I have been able to identify RGPF workers living in that area at the time. The area included Waltham New Town, Waltham Cross and then northwards about half a mile up the main High Road to the 'Old Pond' area of Cheshunt. The nearest housing west of the powder works is Holdbrook, renovated in the 1960's which was built on the original Waltham New Town development which local historians believe to have been developed in response to the growth of the RGPF when guncotton was introduced in the 1860's.

The other local large employer at the time was the Royal Small Arms factory at Enfield Lock. On the returns the initials RSAF are used to indicate small arms workers. At some point during the processing of returns someone had annotated the numerators entries with either Powder or Gun and there are some instances where the wrong allocation has been made. Another problem area is the Gun Cap Factory which employed many of the young women in the area. I have been unable to find which of the two larger factories it came under, or if indeed it was a separate establishment.

A total of 64 RGPF workers were identified, of which 7 appear to be explicitly connected with gunpowder and 3 with guncotton. There are 11 foremen and the manager of the smokeless powder factory and 30 described simply as labourers.

port for the project. Arising from this our membership increased significantly. Many thanks to all those members who acted as both guides and on reception over the weekend.


In addition to the tours a number of stands were erected in the main Library

# **PUBLICATIONS** ADVERTISEMENTS

We have been given advance notice of two books to be published next year which readers may be interested in as they both relate to the area and both include specific historical information on the Waltham Abbey Site:

The first of these is **London's Lea Valley** by **Jim Lewis** which chronicles the industrial and technological developments in the Lea Valley. A pre-publication flier is enclosed with this issue giving more details.

The second book is an English Heritage publication by **Wayne D Cocroft** entitled **Dangerous Energy**. This book relates the archaeology of gunpowder and military explosives manufacture with special reference to the Royal Gunpowder Factory at Waltham Abbey. It details the development of gunpowder manufacture from the Middle Ages, the introduction of higher power explosives materials and rocket propellants. The social history of the industry, provision of worker accommodation, safety provisions, protective clothing and the employment of women in the early twentieth century is also recorded. A final section looks at planning, survey, preservation, conservation and presentation in relation to prospective future uses of explosives manufacturing sites.


